ISAIAH 40:1-11

Comfort for God's People

- ¹ Comfort, comfort my people, says your God.
- ² Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her hard service has been completed, that her sin has been paid for, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.
- ³ A voice of one calling: "In the wilderness prepare the way for the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God.
- ⁴ Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain.

- ⁵ And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the Lord has spoken."
- ⁶ A voice says, "Cry out." And I said, "What shall I cry?" "All people are like grass, and all their faithfulness is like the flowers of the field.
- ⁷ The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the Lord blows on them. Surely the people are grass.
- ⁸ The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever."
- ⁹ You who bring good news to Zion, go up on a high mountain. You who bring good news to Jerusalem, lift up your voice with a shout, lift it up, do not be afraid; say to the towns of Judah, "Here is your God!"
- ¹⁰ See, the Sovereign Lord comes with power, and he rules with a mighty arm. See, his reward is with him, and his recompense accompanies him.
- ¹¹ He tends his flock like a shepherd: He gathers the lambs in his arms and carries them close to his heart; he gently leads those that have young.

MARK 1:1-8 John the Baptist Prepares the Way

- ¹ The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God, ² as it is written in Isaiah the prophet:
 - "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way"—
 - ³ "a voice of one calling in the wilderness,
 - 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him.'"
- ⁴ And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. ⁶ John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ And this was his message: "After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. ⁸ I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

CLOSING HYMN: "Comfort, Comfort, Oh My People"

- 1. Comfort, comfort, O my people, Speak of peace, now says our God; Comfort those who sit in darkness, Mourning 'neath their sorrows' load. Speak unto Jerusalem Of the peace that waits for them; Tell of all the sins I cover, And that warfare now is over.
- 2. Hark, the voice of one who's crying In the desert far and near, Bidding all to full repentance Since the kingdom now is here. O that warning cry obey! Now prepare for God a way; Let the valleys rise to meet him And the hills bow down to greet him.

HYMN NOTES:

HAIL TO THE LORD's ANOINTED: Written by James Montgomery (1771–1854). Montgomery's father was a minister, and his parents later served as missionaries to the West Indies. James remained in Yorkshire and was raised from age 6 in a boy's boarding school administered by the Brethren of Fulneck. Montgomery said, "There, whatever we did was done in the name and for the sake of Jesus Christ, whom we were taught to regard in the amiable and endearing light of a friend and brother."

Inspired by the hymn of the Moravians, he began to write poetry at age 10. Despite flunking out of school at age 14, Montgomery found a job in 1792 at

a radical weekly newspaper, the *Sheffield Register*. He assumed the leadership of the paper not long after, when the previous editor fled the country fearing persecution for his politics. Montgomery changed the name of the paper to the "Iris, and served as editor for 31 years, during which time he was a tireless supporter of social justice. He was jailed twice for his radical views, using the time in prison to write poetry.

This hymn, written in 1821, was originally 8 stanzas and a paraphrase of Psalm 72. Montgomery's paraphrase points to the coming kingdom where the oppressed will be freed and Christ will "rule in equity." (Source: Discipleship Ministries, the United Methodist Church).

The version used in today's service is from the United Methodist Hymnal. The music is Gesangbuch der H.W.k. Hofkapelle; adapted and harmonized by W.H. Monk. The tune is ELLACOMBE. (The hymn was recorded during worship by Christ United, Plano, Texas. We thank them for their unknowing use of their beautiful rendition of this great hymn.)

COMFORT, COMFORT, OH MY PEOPLE: Written by Johannes Olearius (1611–1684, Germany). Born into a family of Lutheran theologians, Olearius received his education at the University of Wittenberg and later taught theology there. He was ordained a Lutheran pastor and appointed court preacher to Duke August of Sachsen-Weissenfels in Halle and later to Duke Johann Adolph in Weissenfels. Olearius wrote a commentary on the entire Bible, published various devotional books, and produced a translation of the Imitatio Christi by Thomas a Kempis. In the history of church music Olearius is mainly remembered for his hymn collection, which was widely used in Lutheran churches. (Source: Bert Polman)

Originally written as a German paraphrase of Isaiah 40:1-5, the text of this hymn was meant to show the promise of better days to come within the coming of the Messiah. The passage from Isaiah marks the beginning of the remaining large passages of prophecies (Isa. 40–66), in which the prophecies display messages of condolence and of hope that the exile of Judah from Babylon will soon be over. The hymn was written by Johann Olearius in honor of St. John the Baptist day and was published in the 1671.
